DESCRIPTION

The purpose of this seminar course is to become familiar with major ideas and thinkers in landscape architecture and environmental planning through discussion and debate of primary literature in the field. Although this is not a history course, it will include some literature that goes back to the early years of the field and that represents the breadth of thinking in both environmental planning and landscape design, as well as other sub-disciplines.

Each week students will lead a debate and discussion on a different theoretical issue based on the assigned readings for that week. All students must read all readings and participate in the discussions.
